

## **Executive Director's Message**



If the last few years have confirmed anything, it is that the only constant is change. The people who have cared for the land now known as Rancho Los Alamitos have a long history of adapting to change to achieve their goals. This past year, with the energy and commitment of its volunteers, community and civic partners, members, donors, and staff, Rancho Los Alamitos embraced new techniques for serving our public and achieving our mission in a world that has changed forever.

RLA's staff and docents learned how to deliver compelling virtual programming during the pandemic, which allowed the organization to continue serving its constituents and reach beyond the boundaries of the seven-and-a-half-acre site. Live remote visits to the Rancho enriched students'

learning for 84% of Long Beach's elementary schools. The site served 57 schools, from San Juan Capistrano to Alhambra. As health department regulations eased, RLA offered a variety of remote and in-person family-friendly, outdoor programs focusing on nature, sustainability, and the area's inextricable history with water. With the aid of innovative and inspired university interns, RLA learned more about the daily lives of early 20th-century ranch workers. We also learned about the people who visit the ranch today – who they are, where they live, and what they expect from Rancho Los Alamitos. These and similar projects provide the tools for delivering on the Rancho's DEI commitments and its continued relevancy to the community.

None of this would be possible without the efforts and support of generous and forwarding-thinking individuals, organizations, and civic leaders who have provided time, talent, leadership, and funding. The Rancho's friends and supporters saw us through a remarkable year that included the most financially successful Cottonwood Award Luncheon in the fundraiser's decade-long history and the replacement of the site's decrepit 1993 Astro van with a donated 2023 Toyota Tacoma 4x4 Crew Cab Long Bed. We carried out the vital and all-but-invisible work of nurturing and preserving the grounds and buildings of a precious historical, cultural, and horticultural resource – a legacy to the people of Southern California. We are honored to be on this journey in service to the community with such loyal and inspiring colleagues.

### **Rancho Los Alamitos**

### **Our History**

The heirs of Florence and Fred Bixby gifted Rancho Los Alamitos to the people of Long Beach in 1968, and the site opened to the public in 1970. Beginning in 1986, the Rancho Los Alamitos Foundation assumed management of the historic site, partnering with the City of Long Beach to preserve and share its rich resources. The Rancho is located on Tongva-Gabrielino land known as Povuun'gna. The Foundation recognizes the profound significance of Povuun'gna as the sacred place of origin of the Indigenous people who stewarded this land for thousands of years before the disruption of Spanish colonization. Beginning with these Indigenous people, the land has nurtured a great diversity of people and cultures over its long history, from the Spanish and Mexican colonists to successive waves of settlers and entrepreneurs from all over the world. Today, the Rancho is a seven-and-a-half acre historic site within the City of Long Beach, one of the most ethnically diverse cities in the United States.



## **School Programs**

- Tovaave: A Tongva Cultural Program for 3rd Graders
- Footprints on the Land Program for 4th Graders





- We sustained engagement with our new virtual school programs, leading 55 virtual school tours for classes as far south as San Juan Capistrano, as far north as Alhambra, and as far east as Claremont.
- Almost half the schools we served this year (28 of 57) receive Title I funding, indicating about half the students we served this year attend schools in underserved areas of Long Beach and beyond.
- We served 84% of the elementary schools in Long Beach Unified School District.

One hundred sixty-four Rancho Volunteers worked **12,550 hours** in 2021-2022 in all aspects of the site's operation. The value of their contribution equates to **\$375,860** or **6.0 FTEs.** 



Rancho Docents at the 2022 National Docent Symposium



In September, the National Docent Symposium welcomed participants from museums and cultural institutions throughout the United States and Canada. Eight RLA docents and one staff member attended. The 2022 Symposium focused on diversity in docent programs, strategies to increase inclusion, accessibility and engagement in public tours, and ongoing docent enrichment.

The three-day conference included sessions that featured best practices from participating groups. Through a competitive application process, the National Docent Symposium Council invited Rancho docents to present a breakout session on RLA's virtual school tours and a Showcase of Ideas table about Tovaave: A Tonga Cultural Program.

RLA's participation added an important voice from historic sites and history museums to a slate of presenters consisting primarily of art museums and institutes.

## **Financial Overview**




In FY2021-22, the Rancho Los Alamitos Foundation exercised sound financial oversight and budget management. Despite a volatile economic outlook, RLA increased its gift shop revenue, its membership income, and its revenue from the organization's major fundraising event. RLA also slightly reduced its expenses while maintaining high standards of programming excellence and site care. The Foundation ended the year in the black with a \$24,290 surplus.


